OUR LIBRARY BUILDING: Today & Tomorrow

YOU'RE INVITED to join us and your fellow community members to give your input on the future of our Library building at one of the following open houses to be held at the San Juan Island Grange Hall:

Sunday, May 20th from 3:00 – 5:00 pm

Sunday, May 20th from 7:00 – 9:00 pm

Monday, May 21st from 1:00 – 3:00 pm

Our team of architects has studied the Library's current building and parking area, and will present its results and conclusions. We'll share information about current and projected issues which affect our ability to adequately provide space and services for current and projected community needs. Some facilities issues include an inadequate parking lot, lack of smaller rooms for group work, no space for growing collections, meeting room and program spaces that don't sufficiently support the number of people attending events, and lack of quiet space in the close quarters of the building.

We want your input in identifying priorities. How do you see us making up for the shortfalls in the facilities? Do we cut back on services to stay within the current constraints? Do we expand the building to solve some of these needs? Or do we consider a move to a new facility designed to meet our community's needs for the next 20 years or more? The latter two options would require an increased financial burden. While we would seek funding first through private donations and government grants and subsidies, some additional support would be required from the community.

After a short presentation you'll be able to visit information stations around the room where you can speak to the architects, Library Trustees, and Library staff--asking questions and indicating your preferences. We want your guidance on how you would like to see the Library grow and serve our community.

Using the results of this process, the Board will evaluate all the information and decide on a path for the Library to pursue.

Please join us in guiding your Library's future.

MESSY ME

This past year, Island Rec and San Juan Island Library have teamed up to offer Messy Me play sessions for preschool age children and their caregivers. Each Messy Me session offers children sensory play and experiential learning opportunities. Held seasonally, the program is free with no prior registration required.

So how does Messy Me work? There are different activity stations placed on the floor or ground. Each station features a sensory material to explore. Paint, slime, sand, water, and shaving cream are just some examples. Messy Me is child led and there is no wrong or right way to playing. The children just have fun, and get a little messy along the way. The next Messy Me will be this summer 2018.



CHECK IT OUT!

Youth Services is adding more Children's Literacy Kits to its collection. New titles include: Pete the Cat Phonics and Learn to Read with Tug the Pup and Friends. All of the Kits now have transparent cases so patrons can easily see what's inside.

Children's Literacy Kits may be borrowed for three weeks. The Kits contain a variety of materials—books, songs, toys, and activity suggestions—to help build early literacy skills. They're great for parents, teachers, and homeschoolers of kids ages birth to 6.

The Importance of Summer Reading at the San Juan Island Library

The Summer Reading Program is a national literacy initiative to foster a love of life-long learning and reading. It is designed to give participants of all socio-economic backgrounds an opportunity to take part in a community wide, interactive program with an emphasis on access to books and other incentives. Both readers and non-readers are encouraged to participate.

In addition to being fun, the Summer Reading Program also is designed to keep youth learning throughout the months when school is not in session to prevent what's known as the 'summer slide'. The summer slide is a tendency for students to lose some of the achievement gains they made through the previous school year.

All Summer Reading Program activities are designed to be educational and recreational, giving participants a range of choices to assist with their learning goals. Best of all, the program is free for the entire community, thanks to funding from our Friends of the San Juan Island Library.

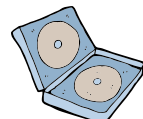

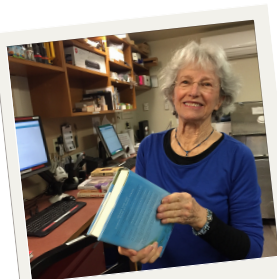

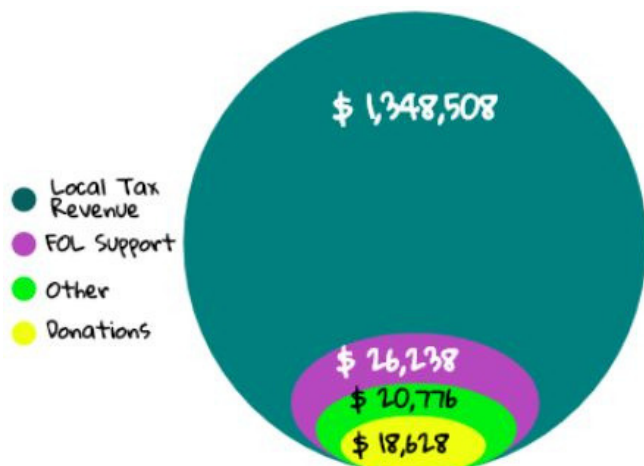

2017 REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE

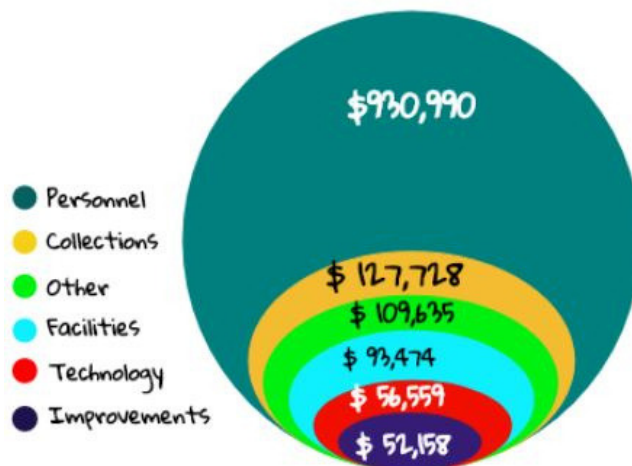
TOTAL REVENUE

New Americans

The Library received two grants to support our on-going English Language Learning, where new Americans have the chance to learn to read, write, hear and speak English. Volunteer tutors are coordinated by an experienced English language teacher, Katrien Danniau, and work with a small group of students at the same level of ability. This past year for the first time we were able to offer an in-depth United States Citizenship component to help new Americans study for the prospective citizens test. Several of our hardworking students will soon become voting citizens as a result of this program.

Our volunteers provide the equivalent of 1.5 full time staff members at the Library. They make it possible to borrow items by working in circulation, shelving, getting new materials ready, and repairing damaged material. Volunteers also tutor English and help people with technology problems on their phones, tablets and computers. The volunteers on the Art Committee hang and label multiple art shows a year, offering a space for artists at all levels to display their beautiful work. Friends of the Library volunteers run a variety of fundraising activities to expand the reach of the Library and our Board of Trustees oversee Library policy and budget.
